

# Understanding Multiple-Partner Fertility in Canada

# **INSIGHTS**

- The rates of multiple-partner fertility (MPF) in Canada are found to align with the rates observed in other countries.
- **Significant variation** in the prevalence of MPF across regions was **found among mothers** but not for fathers, with the highest rates in the Atlantic provinces and Prairies, and the lowest rates in Quebec and Ontario.
- MPF in Canada **"appears closely linked" to the conditions surrounding the birth of the first child**, which supports existing literature.

# **INFORMATION**

**13% and 11%** Proportion of mothers and fathers of at least two children, respectively, who **experienced MPF** 

**17%, 12% and 10%** Proportion of mothers of at least two children aged 25 to 64 in 2011 in the **Atlantic provinces** *and* **the Prairies** (i.e. 17% each), **Quebec and Ontario**, respectively, who had children with more than one partner

**13%, 8% and 7%** Proportion of mothers aged 25 to 64 of at least two children in the Atlantic provinces, Quebec and Ontario, respectively, in 2011 who **experienced MPF within 15 years of the birth of their first child**
